During the first few weeks we will be establishing class routines and work habits. Each class will decide on class rules and these will be displayed in each classroom. The information for the units being taught for Term 1 can be found further on in this update. Should you have any further questions, please do not hesitate to contact your child's classroom teacher.

A reminder that the school has a policy that children need brimmed hats when outside in terms 1 and 4. Caps and stingy brimmed trilbies do not provide enough shade, and so will not be acceptable. There is a small amount of sunblock available but we recommend that you provide your child with some to use at school. Your help with this is appreciated.

A reminder of our cell phone policy - Phones and electronic devices (other than Chromebooks) will be held by the teacher during the day and returned to students at 3pm. If you need to contact your child during the day, or vice versa, this can be done through the school office. Chromebooks are used as a tool in the classroom. It is very important that your child comes to school prepared with a fully charged device.

Year 4-8 will be using the Spotlight tool for reporting progress to students and caregivers. This can be accessed by you via a computer and a mobile app. Students are able to demonstrate their learning throughout the year rather than parents seeing a six monthly report. You will be able to log on and check your child's progress at any time. PBS students from Year 4 have been using this platform for a couple of years now and so are becoming more confident using it, although, there is still a lot for us to learn about using this tool to maximise its abilities. It has been a really tricky start to the term in Red Level and having to wear masks indoors. Literacy Programme

All classes will run daily reading, spelling, grammar, creative and expressive writing, and oral language programmes, continuing to develop skills learnt in previous years but with the focus on developing student's independence in literacy. Students in Year 7 and 8 are no longer learning to read and write, they are reading and writing to learn. By developing independent study skills we are setting a strong foundation for all students to be confident lifelong learners.

All class' Literacy programmes will be supported with the help of Education Perfect which is a NZ based online educational provider that Te Motu syndicate use throughout our programme..

<u>Maths</u>

Through mathematical inquiry, students develop the ability to think creatively, critically, strategically and logically. They learn to structure and to organise, to carry out procedures flexibly and accurately, to process and communicate information, and to enjoy the intellectual challenge. In Te Motu Syndicate, maths is taught in home rooms by the classroom teacher although, as our staff become more au fait with Spotlight and we are no longer in Red Level, we will be offering a variety of

workshops for students across the syndicate to opt into.

This term we will cover -

Number Knowledge and Strategies: Addition, subtraction, multiplication, division, exponents and order of operations.

We will also have an ongoing focus on problem solving and numeracy skills.

Measurement: Converting metric measurement units, and using scales timetables and charts.

Physical Education

Team work, sportsmanship and fair play will all be the focus of our PE programmes. We will be using the classic summer sports to practice these while developing our throwing, catching and striking skills.

Fitness programmes will be developed and will continue throughout the year encouraging students to set their own goals and targets.

The Arts and Languages

Te Reo - Turangawaewae Projects and the online Toku Reo and Education Perfect programmes will continue throughout the year with a big focus on using everyday greetings and instructions as much as possible.

Visual Art - Our major Art focus this term will be inspired by our trips to Kapiti, using the flora and fauna and the impressive landscapes as our inspiration.

Dance and Music - This will be covered through students' involvement in our Music Challenge and our SWAT programme.

Growth Mindset

We will be focussing on ourselves as learners and looking at how we learn and think, and how to be an active learner.

Homework

The main component of homework in Te Motu will be unfinished classwork. Work loads will vary at different times of the year eg practicing speeches. We encourage independent, responsible learning from all students. Daily reading is encouraged and most students will have weekly spelling words to learn.

<u>Inquiry</u>

This term's school wide focus is about Social Responsibility. Students will look at how societies function independently and together, and develop an awareness of cultural identities, values and perspectives of others. Students will develop understandings, skills and attitudes to achieve positive interactions and relationships with others.

A very important part of understanding belonging to a community is knowing all about it, including how it started. So a big part of our syndicate's Inquiry will be looking at local history and environments. Students will be introduced to many local areas of historical significance and will make independent inquiries about areas of special interest to them. So that the students get to see as much of the picture as they can, we will be taking them on a day excursion out to Kapiti Island and next term we will go on a "Tiki Tour" around many of the local heritage sites. We will be needing a lot of parent help to make both of these adventures possible. Notices will come home in a week or so explaining how these trips will work and asking for help. We hope that you will be able to come and join us and join in on our learning journeys.



SWAT TIME

In Te Motu we will be running SWAT Time from week 5 of this term. This is where students will Study With Another Teacher! We operate on the college model, with classes moving from teacher to teacher to be introduced to and taught different subjects. This is an important introduction to what students will meet in college, and also allows the teachers in the syndicate to utilise their own individual strengths, resulting in intensive but very rewarding programmes. This term SWAT Time will involve PE - with the focus on throwing and catching skills, Financial Literacy, First Aid, Digital Citizenship, Drama, and Spanish.

Annual Te Motu Music Challenge!

Each year the classes are given a theme to choose a song from which they then have to work together to create their own "show" to perform to the other classes in the syndicate. The only rule being that everyone must be involved in some way. This year each class has to select a song from a named genre of music. You are more than welcome to come along and be wildly entertained! Performances will be held in the last weeks of term 1. We will inform you of the date and time of the performances as soon as this has been confirmed.
